Welcome to Coventry Cathedral

Mothering Sunday began to be marked as such in the 16th century when people would go to what they considered to be their 'mother church'. For those living away from their family home in service, this might mean walking for several hours to get to the church of their upbringing. Going back to their mother church was a way of acknowledging the importance of that church in setting their life path, and strengthening and upholding them in prayer.

The idea of the mother church is important for cathedrals, who are seen as the mother church of the diocese. Today, we recommit ourselves to that vocation of offering nurturing support to all those in the Coventry Diocese.

Mothering Sunday is also an opportunity to thank God for all those who are like mothers to us; our own biological and adoptive mothers, and all those who care for us. To commemorate this, we will give every adult, child and young person who cares for someone else in the Cathedral this morning a small bunch of daffodils as a way of thanking them for the ways in which they care for others.

We are aware that Mothering Sunday can be painful for some, and so this service also contains moments of reflection where the hurts that we feel today can be held before God.

On this Mothering Sunday we will also thank God for *Remember our Child*, a special pastoral provision for bereaved parents. This has been very important, both to bereaved parents and to the Cathedral as we have sought to minister to them. Today, we offer to God the names of all those who have been remembered in this ministry, entrusting them to God's safekeeping.

As you prepare for this service, you might want to reflect on the ways in which God is like a mother to us, using the words of St Anselm, an eleventh century Archbishop of Canterbury:

Jesus, like a mother you gather your people to you; you are gentle with us as a mother with her children.

Despair turns to hope through your sweet goodness; through your gentleness we find comfort in fear.

Your warmth gives life to the dead, your touch makes sinners righteous.

Lord Jesus, in your mercy heal us; in your love and tenderness remake us.

In your compassion bring grace and forgiveness, for the beauty of heaven may your love prepare us.

If you are visiting or new to us, please introduce yourself to one of the ministers. We hope you will come and worship with us again.Our regular Sunday services are at 10:30 am and 4 pm, and you will receive a warm welcome. During this service, we say the words in **bold** together and stand and sit as indicated. However, you are more than welcome to remain seated if you prefer.

The president today is the Reverend Gillian Roberts. The Reverend Su McClellan, Cathedral Associate Minister is preaching. The deacon is the Very Reverend John Witcombe, Dean of Coventry. The Reverend Nitano Muller, Canon for Worship and Welcome, is sub-deacon.

The Cathedral Choir is directed by Luke Fitzgerald, Acting Director of Music. The organists are David Rice, Acting Assistant Director of Music, and Amelia Parkin, Organ Scholar. The Setting is the Communion Service in C by John Ireland (1879 – 1962).

The Gathering

The Very Reverend John Witcombe, Dean of Coventry, welcomes the congregation. The Peace Bell is rung and we STAND.

The Greeting

The Reverend Gillian Roberts, presiding, says,

The Lord be with you: and also with you.

Praise God who loves us. Praise God who cares.

The Liturgy of Penitence

The Very Reverend John Witcombe, deacon, says,

God says – When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called my son. It was I who taught Ephraim to walk, I took them up in my arms; but they did not know that I healed them. I led them with cords of human kindness, with bands of love. I was to them like those who lift infants to their cheeks. I bent down to them and fed them.

The Collect

The president introduces a time of silent prayer, saying,

Let us ask God to keep and hold us in his love.

God of compassion, whose Son Jesus Christ, the child of Mary, shared the life of a home in Nazareth, and on the cross drew the whole human family to himself: strengthen us in our daily living that in joy and in sorrow we may know the power of your presence to bind together and to heal; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Liturgy of the Word

The Epistle

We SIT for the Epistle, read by Norman Barnes, representing the Cathedral community.

The Sermon

The Reverend Su McClellan, Cathedral Associate Minister, preaching, prays and then we SIT. After the sermon, silence is kept for a time of reflection.

We believe in God the Holy Spirit, who strengthens us with power from on high.

We believe in one God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

The president says,

Let us pray to God who watches over us like a father, tends us like a mother, walks with us like a brother.

We SIT or KNEEL.

The deacon continues,

Loving God, we thank you for your faithfulness towards us; that you stay by our side, weeping as we weep, rejoicing as we rejoice, working for our good, raising us when we fall. Help us to open ourselves to your tender loving care. God of love, hear your children's prayer.

We pray for this Cathedral Church,

thanking you for her calling to be the mother church for the Diocese of Coventry.

Teach us how to nurture our daughter churches, to be a gathering place where all are welcome and where all may be fed.

God of love,

hear your children's prayer.

We give thanks for those who established the Remember our Child ministry at the Cathedral, for those who have led it,

and for all those who have drawn strength from it. Comfort all those who mourn their children

with the assurance that you can never forget them, that you hold them still.

God of love,

hear your children's prayer.

We pray for all those who care, women and men, children and the elderly, thanking you especially for those who have cared for us. Give us imagination to see those whom we are called to care, drawing us especially to the lonely and the despairing. God of love,

hear your children's prayer.

We pray for those who care for others in situations that are dangerous or especially difficult: for those who have fled their homes because of violence, for those who struggle without shelter, warmth or food, for those at the end of their own resources. Be close to them, multiply what they have. God of love,

hear your children's prayer.

We pray for your children who suffer at this time in body, mind or spirit, and for those who care for them. We pray especially for *NN*. Be to them a tender parent who watches over them and binds up all their wounds. God of love, **hear your children's prayer.**

We pray for those who have died, entrusting them to your everlasting arms; amongst them we pray for *NN*.

The president says,

'Our true mother, Jesus, bears us to joy and everlasting life.'

The Peace

We STAND and the president says,

Through the prophet Isaiah, God says, 'As a mother comforts her child, so I will comfort you.'

Isaiah 66:13

The deacon says,

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

All exchange a sign of peace.

Offertory Hymn

During this hymn, a collection is taken. The book containing the names and dates of all the children in the Cathedral's Remember our Child ministry is carried in procession to the Sanctuary and placed upon the High Altar.

The Eucharistic Prayer

The president says,

The president says,

in whom all our hungers are satisfied.

He offered his life for sinners, and with a love stronger than death he opened wide his arms on the cross.

On the night before he died, he came to supper with his friends and, taking bread, he gave you thanks. He broke it and gave it to them, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

At the end of supper, taking the cup of wine, he gave you thanks, and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

The deacon says,

Jesus Christ is Lord Lord, by your cross and resurrection you have set us free. You are the Saviour of the world.

Father, we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross; we remember his dying and rising in glory, and we rejoice that he intercedes for us at your right hand. Pour out your Holy Spirit as we bring before you these gifts of your creation; may they be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

As we eat and drink these holy things in your presence, form us in the likeness of Christ, and build us into a living temple to your glory. Bring us at the last with Mary, Michael and all the saints to the vision of that eternal splendour for which you have created us; through Jesus Christ, our Lord:

by whom and with whom and in whom, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

The ministers receive Communion as the choir sings:

The Giving of Communion

It is our custom for this part of the service to be a time of quiet reflection. Please wait in your seat to be directed by a churchwarden or steward. If you wish to receive gluten-free bread, please ask and we will be happy to accommodate. Those who do not intend to receive Communion, but who would prefer to receive a blessing, are asked to carry this booklet as an indication of your preference to the ministers. During the distribution of Communion the choir sings the Anthem.

Lent Course 2025

Every Tuesday in Lent 4th March, 7pm – 8:30pm, St Michael's House This year's Lent Course is titled 'Hope in Hard Places'. As our world faces huge challenges, the course invites us to ask, "Where is God in all of this?" Written by the team at Embrace the Middle East, it is our hope that you will find encouragement and strength in stories that span over 3000 years of history - showing us that, no matter how dark the times we live in, God remains with us.

We will begin each week at 7pm and end at 8:30pm in the lounge at St Michael's House.

Is a lasting and just peace possible in Israel and Palestine? Wednesday 2nd of April, 7pm

Occupation, war, extremism, terrorism and fear are all words we hear used to describe what is happening in Israel and Palestine. In such a context it's hard to imagine a future where Israeli Jews and Palestinian Muslims and Christians may live in peace, either together or side by side. Is that a pipe dream or is such a future still possible?

Daniel Munayer, director of Musalaha - a reconciliation ministry in Israel and Palestine - and the only Palestinian ever to have addressed the UN Security Council, will explore this question at 7pm on Wednesday 2nd of April here in the Cathedral. J. S. Bach's St Matthew Passion is a masterful musical setting of the narrative of Christ's capture, trial and death. Beyond that, though, it is an exploration, through some of the most extraordinary music ever written, of themes that remain relevant to us all: injustice, persecution, suffering, redemption, hope, and – ultimately – love. This upcoming performance, blending the voices of 100 young choristers, from Trinity Boys Choir and Kieler Knabenchor, aged 10 to 18, offers a rare opportunity to experience the work as Bach originally intended, written as it was for the young voices of Bach's own choir.
