We are delighted that you have been able to join us today!

On Trinity Sunday, Christians celebrate the work of God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three persons yet one God. We rejoice that God exists in relationship, and that each of us is invited to take our place in the dance of perfect love that is shared between Father, Son and Spirit.

The president today is the Reverend Su McClellan, Cathedral Associate Minister. The Very Reverend John Witcombe, Dean of Coventry is deacon. John Lloyd, Cathedral Reader, is sub-deacon. The Reverend Nitano Muller, Canon for Worship and Welcome, is preaching. The choir is directed by Rachel Mahon, Director of Music. The organists are Amelia Parkin and David Rice. The setting today is Missa Festiva by Flor Peeters (1903-1986).

In this service, we say the words in **bold** together, and invite you to stand and sit as indicated. However, please stay seated if you prefer.

If you have brought small children, thank you! Feel free to explore the space with them, and to use the toys and books provided.

We hope you will join us for refreshments after the service. If this is your first time worshiping with us, please do say hello to the ministers at the end, as we would love to get to know you.

The Gathering

The Very Reverend John Witcombe, Dean of Coventry, welcomes the congregation.

The Liturgy of the Word

The New Testament Reading

We SIT for the reading, read by Hannah Wilson, Ordinand on Placement.

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans.

The Sermon

The Reverend Nitano Muller, Canon for Worship and Welcome, preaching, prays and then we SIT. After the sermon time is kept for reflection.

The Affirmation of Faith

We STAND. The president says; Let us affirm our faith in the Triune God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

Amen.

We SIT. The president introduces the intercessions.

In the power of the Spirit and in union with Christ, let us pray to the Father.

The deacon leads us in prayer:

For all the Christian churches in their search for unity, that their oneness will show forth in the unity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Lord in your mercy.

For Charles our King, for Parliament, and all who serve in politics nationally and locally; that they be filled with wisdom, right judgement, and discernment of the common good.

Hear our prayer.

For all couples and families; that the Holy Trinity of love will strengthen their bond, deepen their faith, and bring healing where there is discord.

Lord in your mercy.

Hear our prayer.

For all who are sick in body, mind or spirit, whether at home, in hospital, in hospice care, or in care homes; especially... Lord in your mercy.

Hear our prayer.

For the faithful departed: those who have died recently, and all whose anniversary we keep; especially... may they enjoy the fullness of life with the Blessed Trinity.

Lord in your mercy.

Hear our prayer.

At the end, the president says,

Merciful Father accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

The president says,

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God.

For with your only-begotten Son and the Holy Spirit you are one God, one Lord.
All that you reveal of your glory, the same we believe of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, without any difference or inequality.

We, your holy Church, acclaim you, Father of majesty unbounded, your true and only Son, worthy of all worship, and the Holy Spirit, advocate and guide. Three Persons we adore, one in being and equal in majesty.

And so with angels and archangels, with cherubim and seraphim, we sing for ever of your glory:

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying:

Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

The deacon says,

Great is the mystery of faith:

Christ has died:

Christ is risen:

Christ will come again.

The president continues,

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of Mary, Michael and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

The Lord's Prayer

We SIT. Please feel free to say the Lord's Prayer in any language or version you prefer.

The president says;

As our Saviour taught us, so we pray

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever.

The Breaking of the Bread

The president breaks the consecrated bread, saying,

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ. Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

The Invitation to Communion

to the glory of God the Father.

The ministers receive communion as the choir sings:

The Giving of Communion

The ministers receive Communion before sharing the bread and wine with the congregation. Please wait in your seat to be directed by a churchwarden or steward. If you wish to receive gluten-free bread, please ask and we will be happy to accommodate. Those who do not intend to receive Communion, but who would prefer to receive a blessing, are asked to carry this booklet as an indication of your preference to the ministers.
