#### News from ICONS (International Cross of Nails Schools)

During these last few weeks we have enjoyed hosting an ICONS Ambassadors day with two schools – Lagan College, Belfast, Northern Ireland and King Henry VIII School Coventry. Despite a 5am start for the pupils from Belfast they enjoyed a tour of the two cathedrals and engaged in peace building workshops. They left considering the difference between Destructive Consent and Constructive Dissent.



Lagan College is an integrated college located in South Belfast. It was founded in 1981 by parents who wanted their Catholic and Protestant children to be educated together, at a time when the people of Belfast and the general school system was generally divided by faith. The project was controversial and struggled with getting public support, but the school first opened for 28 students and grew to become very sought-after. Today Lagan College is known for its work on reconciliation and all-faith inclusion.

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#### Updates from our Cathedral volunteer interns



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# Thought for the Month April 2024

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# Praying for Resolution in the Holy Land

"Out of the depth I cry to you, O Lord. Lord, hear my voice.. Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications." (Psalm 132.1)

How many times have we prayed for God to hear us since the appalling Hamas attacks of October 7th? How many times have we prayed for the release of the hostages held by them? For an end to the overwhelming bombing of Gaza, which has killed mostly women and children? For an end to the siege which has resulted in 2 million people facing the threat of imminent famine? For a stick to be placed in the spokes of rising anti-Semitic and Islamophobic attacks beyond the borders of Israel and Palestine?

At the moment the fog of war makes it almost impossible to imagine a future beyond the horrors of the current conflict. Many of the people I meet, as I go about my work for Embrace the Middle East, have a view on how the longstanding Israeli/ Palestinian conflict should be resolved. At Embrace we don't hold a position on what the future of the land we call holy should look like. We are clear that it is a matter for those who call Israel and Palestine home. However, that does not mean that each of us does not have a part to play in healing the wounds of history, learning to live with difference, celebrating diversity and building a culture of justice and peace.

For both Palestinians and Israeli Jews, the wounds of history are deep and in some cases still open and festering. Before healing can begin we have to stop infection. How those us of who surround the conflict, but are not part of it, behave plays a significant part in feeding or stopping contagion. Do our actions form a healing salve, or do they open the wounds wider?

In a soundbite culture that gives us limited characters with which to express an opinion, holding the space for difference and diversity is no easy task. It is an act of resistance against forces that insist on binary divisions which in the end will only result in a zero sum game. Both the CCN and Embrace have the privilege of partnering with Musalaha, the reconciliation organization working in Israel and Palestine to bring Israelis and Palestinians together to co resist the systemic injustice that results in power imbalance and disenfranchisement.

In the current context this work has become even more urgent as the only hope for lasting peace is a culture of justice that recognizes the Imago Dei in every human being. As we continue to cry from the depths of our souls for the people of Israel and Palestine, we need to remember the words of St Terresa of Avila:

"Christ has no body on earth but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes with which he looks compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good."

In other words, we all have our part to play.
