

News from the Nagelkreuzgemeinschaft Can the wounds of history be healed? International Young Reconcilers' Gathering, Berlin, 12-13 October 2024



Berlin has been shaped like no other city by German history. Join us for discussion with our Berlin partners, including the Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church and the Chapel of Reconciliation, on whether the wounds of history can be healed; different forms of remembrance; and how wounds can be healed without crimes being critically appraised. Open to young reconcilers from 18 to 28 from Europe; however:

- German participants from 16 with parental consent; those older than 28 but still studying please contact us!
- Those outside of Europe interested to attend, please contact us asap.

Accommodation will be in homestays with members of the CCN and hostels. There is no cost for event participation, just a small fee for meals. There is the potential for some travel costs to be subsidized to a certain amount - please <u>contact us</u> for more details.









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Our first virtual Cross of Nails presentation: the Denis Hurley Centre

Distance, cost and environmental concerns are all reasons to look at alternative ways to present our Crosses of Nails from time to time: cue our first virtual Cross presentation, following the livestreamed Litany of Reconciliation at Coventry Cathedral on Thursday 27th June, to the <u>Denis Hurley Centre</u> in Durban, South Africa. Roman Catholic Archbishop Bernard Langley, a Patron of the Centre, will receive the Cross of Nails in Coventry on the Centre's behalf, with a corresponding service planned to take place in Durban alongside. The Cross will then be mailed to Durban.

The Centre works with people of all faith traditions to serve some of the poorest people in central Durban, in particular homeless people, drug users, the urban unemployed, and refugees, offering them community support and pastoral outreach. We're so pleased to be partnering with them, in an important multiple-anniversary year for the Centre.

The CCN Sunday online service will be created by our German partners this year, and shared just before the day. Please do consider how you might mark CCN Sunday this year to remind and inspire your community about your work: reconciliation is needed more than ever.

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Thought for the Month May 2024

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The Diocese of Huron's journey to the CCN

The Very Reverend Paul Millward, then Rector of the Cathedral and Dean of the Diocese, had the opportunity to meet with The Reverend Canon Dr Sarah Hills, Canon for Reconciliation at Coventry Cathedral in 2017. She shared the story of how the ministry of Reconciliation began and how it has evolved since those earliest days following World War II. A seed was planted, and after a period of discernment we sought out ways to grow the work of reconciliation in our communities and especially with our Indigenous siblings, the hope being that we would be admitted as a partner in the CCN and receive a Cross of Nails. The journey had begun.

Later that year, he began offering The Litany every Wednesday on the steps of the cathedral. If I happened to be in London (Ontario) on a Wednesday I would join those gathered. Occasionally, if he had another commitment, he would ask me to lead: I was always honoured by the ask and humbled by the act. In 2019 when Coronavirus curtailed inperson worship, like many other Deacons, I was unable to carry out my ministries. I sent a proposal offering to pray the Litany from the steps of my church, St. James, in Stratford., Ontario, which received wholehearted approval, and when due to further restrictions I could no longer gather a group there, I brought the Litany to my home on the Lake Huron shore. Once a week, I offered it on the beach, in the sand dunes in front of, and in the forest behind, my home. No cathedral or church steps involved, just the beauty and majesty of God's creation. In October 2020 Paul+ announced his retirement and asked me to carry on the ministry. I have been offering The Litany of Reconciliation every week since, recording it and uploading it.

On April 27th, with great joy, we received our Cross of Nails. Our journey is not over. We will continue to pray for peace and justice in the middle east, for all the corners of the world where there is conflict, and continue to work on reconciliation with our Indigenous siblings. We will likewise continue to pray the Coventry Litany of Reconciliation.
