Welcome to Coventry Cathedral

It is a joy and a privilege to welcome you to this special service today. This is a great occasion in the life of the Diocese of Coventry as we celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of our Cathedral Church, and we are honoured by the presence of His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, to set the seal on our celebrations. While Her Majesty The Queen laid the foundation stone of the Cathedral on 23rd March 1956 and was present for its Consecration on 25th May 1962, we have been delighted to welcome in turn Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother for our Silver Jubilee and Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal, just ten years ago, for our Golden Jubilee celebration.

This magnificent building is laden with rich symbolism which speaks of the love, hope, faith and reconciliation we find in Christ. The decision to rebuild the Cathedral was taken on 15th November 1940, just hours after it had been destroyed in an overnight air-raid. Rebuilding would not be an act of defiance, but rather a sign of faith, trust and hope for the future of the world. It was this vision of Provost Richard Howard which led the people of Coventry away from feelings of bitterness and hatred and birthed the Cathedral's Ministry of Peace and Reconciliation, which has provided spiritual and practical support, in areas of conflict throughout the world. This is a ministry shared with the whole Diocese of Coventry - with our parishes, schools and chaplaincies - and with our partners in the Community of the Cross of Nails and Together for Hope.

Our Cathedral is a treasure - a diamond - and stands today as a continuing symbol of reconciliation and peace. As a diamond has many facets so does the Cathedral. Through our vision and ministry of hospitality, spirituality, reconciliation, creativity and the arts, risk taking and community, we pray that God will continue to hone, shape and mould us to be the people and Cathedral church he calls us to be today. We worship together today. May the beauty of the building, the scriptures, the music, colour, symbolism and prayerfulness speak to you of the things of the living God and may we all be equipped in the power of God's Spirit to serve the church and the world.

The Gathering

Just before the service, The Very Reverend John Witcombe, Dean, welcomes the congregation. At 11.00am, the Peace Bell is rung and we STAND to sing the opening hymn, during which the procession of choir, ministers and children enters from the Cathedral Ruins

The Word of God

Reading

We SIT for the first reading, read by Martin R Williams, Cathedral Warden

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

Reading

We remain SEATED for the reading, led by Canon Emma Griffiths,

Head of Reconciliation & Education at the Cathedral, with students from our diocesan schools and academies.

Listen, this is our story.

Jesus said, “There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, “Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.” So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and travelled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need.

Listen, this is our story

So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, “How many of my father’s hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, ‘Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands.’” So, he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far

off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him.

Listen, this is our story

Then the son said to him, “Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.” But the father said to his slaves, “Quickly, bring out a robe—the best one—and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!” And they began to celebrate. Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, “Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.” Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, “Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!”
