The Gathering

The Dean welcomes the congregation. Silence is kept and the Peace Bell is sounded.

The Litany of Penitence

We remain STANDING. Margaret East, Cathedral Reader, serving as Deacon, says,

Compassion and forgiveness belong to the Lord our God, though we have rebelled against God.

Daniel 9:9

We come into God's presence, aware of past failures, to seek God's forgiveness. In the silence, we bring our community before God in penitence and faith.

Silence is kept.

Lord God, our maker and our redeemer, hear us as we cry out to you in our need and anguish: Lord forgive us: We have not loved you with all our heart, or our neighbours as ourselves. Lord forgive us

and heal us.

For sins of negligence and ignorance: Lord forgive us

and heal us.

For feeble faith and judgemental attitudes: Lord forgive us and heal us.

For self-deceit and colluding with falsehood: Lord forgive us and heal us.

For complacency and lack of vigilance that have made others vulnerable to harm: Lord forgive us and heal us.

Bind up the wounds of those who have been hurt and in your mercy make us whole.

The President says,

The almighty and merciful Lord grant you pardon and forgiveness of all your sins, time for amendment of life, and the grace and comfort of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Gloria in Excelsis

We remain STANDING. The choir sings the Gloria.

Glory be to God on high, and on earth peace, good will towards men. We praise thee, we bless thee, we worship thee, we glorify thee, we give thanks to thee for thy great glory, O Lord God, heavenly King, God the Father Almighty. O Lord, the only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ; O Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us. Thou that takest away the sins of the world, receive our prayer. Thou that sittest at the right hand of God the Father, have mercy upon us. For thou only art holy; thou only art the Lord; thou only, O Christ, with the Holy Ghost, art most high in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The Collect

The President introduces a time of silent prayer, and says,

Loving God, you keep us as the apple of your eye and hide us under the shadow of your wings: keep us watchful, yet caring, trusting, yet ready to question, that all who worship here may do so in safety and in the knowledge of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord who is alive and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

The Liturgy of the Word

The First Reading

We SIT for the first reading, read by Rob Halligan, representing the Cathedral Community.

A reading from the First Letter of John.

¹⁶We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. ¹⁷How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? ¹⁸ Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. ¹⁹And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will reassure our hearts before him ²⁰whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything. ²¹Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have boldness before God; ²²and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him. ²³ And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us.

²⁴All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us.

The Gospel

We turn to face the Deacon. The Deacon introduces:

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹ Now all the tax-collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. ² And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, 'This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them.' ³ So he told them this parable:

⁴ 'Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? ⁵When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. ⁶And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbours, saying to them, "Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost." ⁷Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous people who need no repentance. ⁸ 'Or what woman having ten silver coins, if she loses one of them, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it? ⁹When she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbours, saying, "Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost." ¹⁰Just so, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.'

The Sermon

The Reverend Kate Massey, Canon for Arts and Reconciliation, leads us in prayer and then we SIT for the sermon. After the sermon silence is kept for reflection.

The Affirmation of Faith

We STAND. The President says,

Let us declare our faith in God.

We believe in God the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named.

We believe in God the Son, who lives in our hearts through faith, and fills us with his love.

We believe in God the Holy Spirit, who strengthens us with power from on high.

We believe in one God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

Prayers of Intercession

The President introduces the intercessions:

In the power of the Spirit and in union with Christ, let us pray to the Father.

We SIT as the Deacon continues with the intercessions. Concluding with the President leading:

Merciful Father
accept these prayers
for the sake of your Son,
our Saviour Jesus Christ.
Amen.

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

The Peace

We STAND. The President introduces the peace with these, or other suitable words:

Jesus said, 'Love one another.'
As I have loved you, so you are to love one another.'

John 15:12

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

The Deacon says,

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

The Prayer of Preparation at the Table

The President says,

In these gifts of bread and wine, you give us a taste of your boundless kingdom where the hungry are fed, the grieving rejoice, and the wounded are healed.

Transform us, who receive these gifts, that we might extend your watchful, gentle, protective love to those around us.

Amen.

The Eucharistic Prayer

The President introduces:

The Lord is here.

His Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

Blessed are you, Lord God, our light and our salvation; to you be glory and praise for ever. From the beginning you have created all things and all your works echo the silent music of your praise. In the fullness of time you made us in your image, the crown of all creation.

You give us breath and speech, that with angels and archangels and all the powers of heaven we may find a voice to sing your praise:

The choir sings the Sanctus and Benedictus.

Holy, holy, holy Lord God of Hosts. Heaven and earth are full of thy glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The President continues:

How wonderful the work of your hands, O Lord. As a mother tenderly gathers her children, you embraced a people as your own. When they turned away and rebelled your love remained steadfast.

From them you raised up Jesus our Saviour, born of Mary, to be the living bread, in whom all our hungers are satisfied.

He offered his life for sinners, and with a love stronger than death he opened wide his arms on the cross.

On the night before he died, he came to supper with his friends and, taking bread, he gave you thanks. He broke it and gave it to them, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

At the end of supper, taking the cup of wine, he gave you thanks, and said:
Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant,

which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

The Deacon says,

lesus Christ is Lord:

Lord, by your cross and resurrection you have set us free. You are the Saviour of the world.

Father, we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross; we remember his dying and rising in glory, and we rejoice that he intercedes for us at your right hand.

Pour out your Holy Spirit as we bring before you these gifts of your creation; may they be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

As we eat and drink these holy things in your presence, form us in the likeness of Christ. and build us into a living temple to your glory.

Remember, Lord, your Church in every land. Reveal her unity, guard her faith, and preserve her in peace.

Bring us at the last with Mary, Michael, and all the saints to the vision of that eternal splendour for which you have created us; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, by whom, with whom, and in whom, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power be yours for ever and ever.

Amen.

Silence is kept.

The Lord's Prayer

We SIT. Please feel free to say the Lord's Prayer in any language or version which is closest to your heart.

Jesus, Good Shepherd, we hear your voice, and pray as you have taught us:

Our Father in heaven,

Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.

The President breaks the consecrated bread, saying,

Jesus, we break this bread remembering your body broken for us. By your wounds, we are healed.

The Invitation to Communion

The President says,

Come to this table, not because you must, but because you may, not because you are strong, but because you are weak.

Come, not because any goodness of your own gives you a right to come,

but because you need mercy and help.

Come, because you love the Lord a little
and would like to love him more.

Come, because he loved you and gave himself for you.

Come and meet the risen Christ, for we are his body.

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The Agnus Dei

The Choir sings the Agnus Dei.

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy on us.

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy on us.

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, grant us thy peace.

The Giving of Communion

The ministers and the people receive Communion. Those who do not intend to receive Communion but wish to receive a blessing are asked to carry this booklet as you come forward, as an indication of your preference. During the distribution, the choir sings:

Reconciliation in a Time of Conflict

Saturday, 18th October, 10am – 3.30pm

How can we talk about reconciliation in the midst of war? We know the Bible calls us to be reconcilers, but what does the Christian ministry of reconciliation look like in a time of conflict? What are the challenges faced by those in the context of war, and what might we learn about being reconcilers in a society increasingly characterised by cultural division and conflict? How can we pray, act and speak in these turbulent times?

Christians in Ukraine and Israel Palestine have approached this question in different ways, which will in turn help shape our understanding and action in our own contexts.

This significant day conference is hosted by the British Trust for Tantur, which supports the work of the Tantur Ecumenical institute, on the border between Jerusalem and Bethlehem. We will be welcoming their Rector, Fr. John Paul SJ, along with guests from Ukraine, to lead us in our reflection.

This conference will run from $10.00-3.30\,\mathrm{pm}$ at Coventry Cathedral, a community known for its commitment to reconciliation, and as a place to reflect and respond to these difficult questions.
