Introduction

e gather today in joyful worship to welcome and install the Right Reverend Sophie Rebecca Jelley as the tenth Bishop of Coventry. This significant occasion marks a new chapter in the life of our diocese, whose story stretches back to the earliest roots of Christianity in this region, shaped by the mission of St Chad in the 7th century and continuing through centuries of faithful witness.

The Diocese of Coventry, formally established in 1918, has long been marked by its commitment to Christian unity, peace, and reconciliation-a charism born from the ashes of war and rooted in the spirit of hope. The ruins of the old Cathedral, standing alongside the new, remain a powerful symbol of our call to healing and renewal, both within the Church and in the wider world.

Today's service reflects the rich worshipping life of our diocese, shaped by the gifts of its diverse communities and strengthened through partnership with ecumenical friends, civic leaders, and international companions. Together, we express our common calling to be ambassadors of Christ's love and justice.

ishop Sophie comes among us to be

our shepherd and pastor, to lead us in worship and mission, to teach us and inspire us in the Faith

This service is designed to reflect our understanding of this ministry, and to lead all of us – the People of God – on a pilgrimage of faith in the God who has entrusted to us the ministry of reconciliation.

The Order of Service

he Entrance takes place in the Ruins of the mediaeval Cathedral, destroyed on the night of 14th November 1940. The Bishop (escorted by the Archdeacon of Canterbury) enters the Ruins in silence, before praying the Coventry Litany of Reconciliation in front of the Charred Cross and the Altar of Reconciliation.

he Preparation begins with the new Bishop entering her cathedral through doors which are wide open in hospitality – the first of the Cathedral's values – and being welcomed by young people of the diocese. She invokes the presence of God using words from the Consecration of the Cathedral in 1962, before entering an intimate time of prayer and anointing for new ministry.

he Installation lies at the very heart of the service, with the Bishop being seated in her cathedra (from which the word Cathedral is derived). This is the seat from which the Bishop leads God's people in her diocese as Teacher, Chief Pastor, and Leader. The installation is performed, according to historic precedent, by the Archdeacon of Canterbury, and the Bishop's first act from the cathedra is to proclaim the Gospel, for she comes among us as the principal minister, in this church and diocese, of the Good News of Jesus Christ.

he Inaugural Sermon follows on from the proclamation of the Gospel. Bishop Sophie opens God's word to us and calls us to the vision of God's kingdom revealed in Jesus Christ.

he Welcome provides an opportunity for representatives of civic and church life to offer a word of welcome to Bishop Sophie, her husband Chris, and their children. As the choirs sing the great hymn of the church, the *Te Deum*, the Bishop is greeted by representatives from around the diocese who present her with symbols reflecting its life, ministry and partnerships.

he Prayers of Intercession and Dedication reflect the mission and ministry of the Diocese of Coventry as we seek the Spirit of God to lead us in this new season.

he Blessing is the culmination of the service – having taken the Diocesan Crozier from the High Altar (where it was placed by Bishop Christopher Cocksworth when he bade farewell to the diocese in 2023), the Bishop blesses us, the city and diocese from the West Screen in words which focus our attention on the light of Christ and the work of mission and evangelism in the world.

Excerpts from the Charge

Given by The Right Reverend and Right Honourable Dame Sarah Mullally DBE, Bishop of London At the Confirmation of Election, Lambeth Palace

To our well-beloved sister in Christ, Sophie, now Bishop of Coventry.

You are to be charged with many important tasks and ministries in your vocation as a Bishop in the Church of England. There will be much for you to consider, great challenges to face, as well as, I pray, great joy along the way.

Amidst all the responsibility that rests on your shoulders, and all the many things you must do, may I urge you to remember that your ministry, and the Church itself, does not depend on you, but the one who has called and commissioned you. Jesus Christ said, 'I am the way, the truth and the life' (John 14.6). I charge you, therefore, to hold on and remember that the most important thing for you as a Bishop is not who you are but whose you are. Hold fast to Christ, do not lose sight of Him, and He will guide you in all things.

Bishops in the Church of England are called to share in the ministry of the Gospel of Christ, proclaiming His promise of hope and eternal life in a world of death and despair. It's in this broken world that God calls you to servant leadership, which guards the flock of Christ, exercising the ministry of a shepherd, contending for, and upholding, the unity of the church and guiding it in witness and service. In the uncertainty of the world, may Christ strengthen you to confidently live out the vocation to which God has called you and His Church.

The Crown Nominations Commission considered prayerfully and carefully the call of the next Bishop of Coventry, which is to share the historic and eternal Gospel with a changing world, and to encourage all Christians in their witness so that more people become disciples of Jesus Christ. It discerned an especial sense of urgency around tasks and ministries, which I now set before you, to guide you as you prepare to take up your new office.

In particular, the Commission discerned that you are called to be 'A prayerful pastor, teacher and reconciler', 'A passionate, visionary and strategic leader in mission and evangelism', 'A shaper and communicator of strategy' and 'A prophetic voice'.

As Diocesan Bishop of Coventry, you are called to lead the Diocese in discerning its particular vision for God's ministry and mission, following His call to care for the sick, the hungry, the imprisoned, the stranger and the orphan around us and, in so doing, proclaiming the Good News of the God who came and lived among us that we might know and share His love for us here on Earth. Jesus who loved all alike, who counted tax collectors and fishermen as friends, invites you to bring people to Christ's table. He calls us to build a church where each living stone is valued...

May you recognize and empower the gifts of those whom you are called to serve, to encourage lay people and clergy alike in their journeys of discernment. The Book of I Peter reads 'Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received' (I Peter 4:10). May you draw out the unique and remarkable gifts, which your flock has received from God, that each one may, in partnership, be put to the service of the Lord and His church, for the sake of the service of God's Kingdom.

And finally, may you be present and part of your community as our Lord Jesus Christ was, in both the joy of the wedding at Cana and the suffering of the funeral of the widow's son, in sharing hospitality and friendship. May you serve those within it as Christ calls us to, and to care particularly for those who are suffering, distressed and isolated, seeking to ease the burdens of those we serve by our deeds and words...

So may the Lord of heaven, who gives you the will to undertake these things, give you also the strength to perform them, and by His divine providence may His holy angels succour and defend you on earth; and may His grace and blessing be with you at all times. Amen.

From inside the doors of the Cathedral, wide open in welcome, the Bishop invokes the presence of God, using words from the Consecration Service on May 25^{th} 1962

Greeting

The young people stand before the Bishop, facing her, and ask in turn.

A young person, Faye Henderson, from Barr's Hill School asks:

Who are you, that you come to this place?

Bishop Sophie:

I am Sophie, a servant of Christ, called to be a bishop in the Church of God.
I come in faith and obedience, to share in the life of this diocese and to walk with the people of God in this place.

Faye asks:

Why have you come among us?

Bishop Sophie:

I come to serve – as your bishop and pastor, to preach the Gospel, to celebrate the sacraments, to lead in mission, and to care for all.

I come not with easy answers, but with a listening heart, ready to learn from you and to walk the way of Christ together. I come to honour the calling of this diocese – to be a sign of peace, a place of reconciliation, and a people of hope.

Faye asks:

How do you come among us, and with what confidence?

Bishop Sophie:

I come not in my own strength, but in the power of the Holy Spirit and the mercy of God who calls each of us by name. I come with confidence in Christ, who breaks down walls and makes us one. And I come with the prayers of many, trusting that, together, we will walk in the ministry of reconciliation entrusted to this city and this Church.

A young person, Lisa Karan from Bluecoat CoE School, reads

You are coming to Christ, who is the living cornerstone of God's temple. He was rejected by people, but he was chosen by God for great honour.

And you are living stones that God is building into his spiritual temple. What's more, you are his holy priests. Through the mediation of Jesus Christ, you offer spiritual sacrifices that please God.

You are royal priests, a holy nation, God's very own possession. As a result, you can show others the goodness of God, for he called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light.

"Once you had no identity as a people; now you are God's people. Once you received no mercy; now you have received God's mercy."

I Peter 2: 4-5, 9b-10 (NLT)

The Dean continues

We pray for you today that you may know and receive the anointing of God's grace and be strengthened for your ministry among us.

Anointing

Everyone SITS or KNEELS

The choir sings the isiXhosa prayer, as Bishop Sophie is anointed for her new ministry, celebrating her ministry in Africa.

You are invited to pray in silence or to join in the singing

Ndikhokhele Bawo Ndikhokhele Mmeli wami Zalomhlaba Bawo Bawo ndiya bonga ngoba wena Usandi gcinile. Sundikhokhele Ezintsizini Hlal' Uhlele duze kwami.

He paid for me (by dying on the cross), my Father He paid for me by representing me While on earth, my Father Father I thank you because you Will always keep me (safe). I implore you to lead me (so that I may follow) During times of sorrow/strife You are always standing nearby.

Bishop Sophie is anointed with oil produced in Palestine by cooperatives which are part of the Palestine Fair Trade Association. Her forehead and her hands are anointed by the Reverend Sarah Edmonds Maguire, Area Dean of Shipston, The Reverend David Poultney, Area Dean of Nuneaton and the Reverend Aggy Parlairet, Rector at St Francis Radford, respectively, symbolizing that her ministry is rooted in the life and support of the wider diocesan family.

Following the anointing, the Bishop takes her pastoral staff and traces the first two letters of the name of Christ in Greek **XP** upon the Chi-Rho, a declaration that she is above all else a servant of Jesus Christ.

The Bishop leads the following

Acclamation

Come, Holy Spirit, fire of the living God, kindle in us the flame of your love.

Come, Holy Spirit, renew the face of the earth.

With the wind of your presence, stir our hearts for worship. With the breath of your power, strengthen us for mission. Come, Holy Spirit, fill your Church with life and hope.

Collect for the Feast of Pentecost

The Bishop says

Holy Spirit, sent by the Father, Ignite in us your holy fire, Strengthen your children with the gift of faith, Revive your Church with the breath of love And renew the face of the earth, Through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Bishop and her procession move to the front of the Nave.

The members of the Bishop's procession take their places in the chancel, save for the Dean, the Archdeacon of Canterbury, the Provincial Registrar, the Diocesan Chancellor and the Chaplain.

The Installation

The Bishop, at the foot of the chancel steps, addresses the Dean and says

Mr. Dean, I thank you for your welcome and for your prayers. I now ask to be inducted and installed into the Bishopric of Coventry.

The Archdeacon of Canterbury, standing alongside her, says

Mr. Dean, I bring you greetings from His Grace, Archbishop Stephen the Lord Archbishop of York and present to you his Mandate.

The Dean says

Mr. Archdeacon, you are most welcome and we thank you for the greetings you bring.

The Dean turns to the Diocesan Chancellor and presents the Mandate to him, saying

Let the Archbishop's Mandate be read.

The Diocesan Chancellor reads the Mandate.

Declaration of Assent

The Dean continues

The Church of England is part of the one, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the holy scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons.

Sophie, in the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

The Bishop replies

I, Sophie Rebecca Jelley, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the holy scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.

Oath of Allegiance

The Bishop, holding a Bible in her right hand and turning to face the congregation, says

I, Sophie Rebecca Jelley, Bishop of Coventry, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles the Third, His Heirs and Successors according to Law: So help me God.

Oath of Obedience

The Bishop, turning to face the Archdeacon of Canterbury, continues to hold the Bible in her right hand, saying

In the name of God. Amen.

I, Sophie Rebecca Jelley, Bishop of the Church and See of Coventry, do profess and promise all due reverence and obedience to the Archbishop and the Metropolitical Church of Christ in Canterbury and to their successor: So help me God, through Jesus Christ.

The College of Canons and Cathedral Chapter stand.

Oath of Fidelity

The Dean invites the Bishop to take the Oath of Fidelity, saying

Bishop Sophie, I now invite you to take the Oath of Fidelity to the Constitution and Statutes of this Cathedral Church.

The Bishop, holding the Bible in her right hand, says

I, Sophie Rebecca Jelley, by Divine Permission Bishop of Coventry, promise that in as much as in me lies I will be a faithful pastor to the clergy and people of this diocese that we may all be equipped for work in God's service and build up the body of Christ; and furthermore I do solemnly declare that I shall faithfully observe and keep the Constitution, Statutes, Ordinances and Customs and preserve the Liberties of this Cathedral Church; and shall set forth and promote such works as may be fitly done therein for the service of God and for the benefit of His Church, so help me God.

The Bishop kneels and the Dean invites representatives from the various places she has served to come forward and lay hands as he prays for her, saying

Let us pray.

Silence is kept.

Come, Holy Spirit, breath of God and fire of love.
Anoint your servant Sophie with grace and power as she takes up the office of Bishop in this Diocese of Coventry. Grant her wisdom to lead, compassion to serve and courage to speak your truth in love.
Strengthen her in the ministry of reconciliation entrusted to this city and this Church.
May she walk closely with Christ, build up your people in faith and hope, and be a sign of your peace in the world.
Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Act of Installation

The Dean addresses the Archdeacon of Canterbury, saying

Mr. Archdeacon, I ask you to fulfil the Mandate of the Archbishop of York.

Everyone STANDS

Anthem

The Bishop is escorted by the Archdeacon of Canterbury to the cathedra as the Choir sings

God be in my head and in my understanding.

At the conclusion of the anthem, the Archdeacon takes the Bishop, standing, by her right hand, saying

By virtue of the Mandate of the Most Reverend Father in God Stephen Geoffrey by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York, I William Jonathan Adam, Archdeacon of The Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of Christ in Canterbury, induct and install you Sophie Rebecca Jelley into possession of the Bishopric of Coventry with its rights and dignities and all its opportunities for service; and I place you (here the Bishop is seated) in the episcopal seat of this Cathedral Church of St Michael in Coventry in the name of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

May the Lord preserve your going out and your coming in, from this time forth and for evermore.

Amen.

The Reverend Canon Nitano Muller, Residentiary Canon for Worship and Welcome, presents the Diocesan Crozier, which was laid on the altar upon the retirement of the ninth Bishop of Coventry, and gives it to the Bishop saying

Bishop Sophie, receive this crozier, a gift from the people of Denmark at the consecration of this Cathedral, as a sign of your office as Bishop of Coventry. May it be for you a symbol of Christ the Good Shepherd, and a reminder of your calling to lead with courage, to reconcile with grace, and to serve with love. **Amen.**

The Gospel

A fanfare is sounded. The congregation welcomes the newly installed Bishop with applause.

Everyone remains STANDING as the book of the Gospels is brought to the Bishop by the Reverend Modupe Adeoye, deacon, Assistant Curate in the Parish of St. Nicholas, Nuneaton and St James Weddington & Caldecote.

Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia,

Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia.

'Go, and make disciples of all nations, says the Lord; And remember, I am with you always to the end of the age. Alleluia, alleluia.

The Bishop proclaims the Gospel from her cathedra.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Glory to you, O Lord.

"Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going.

Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."
